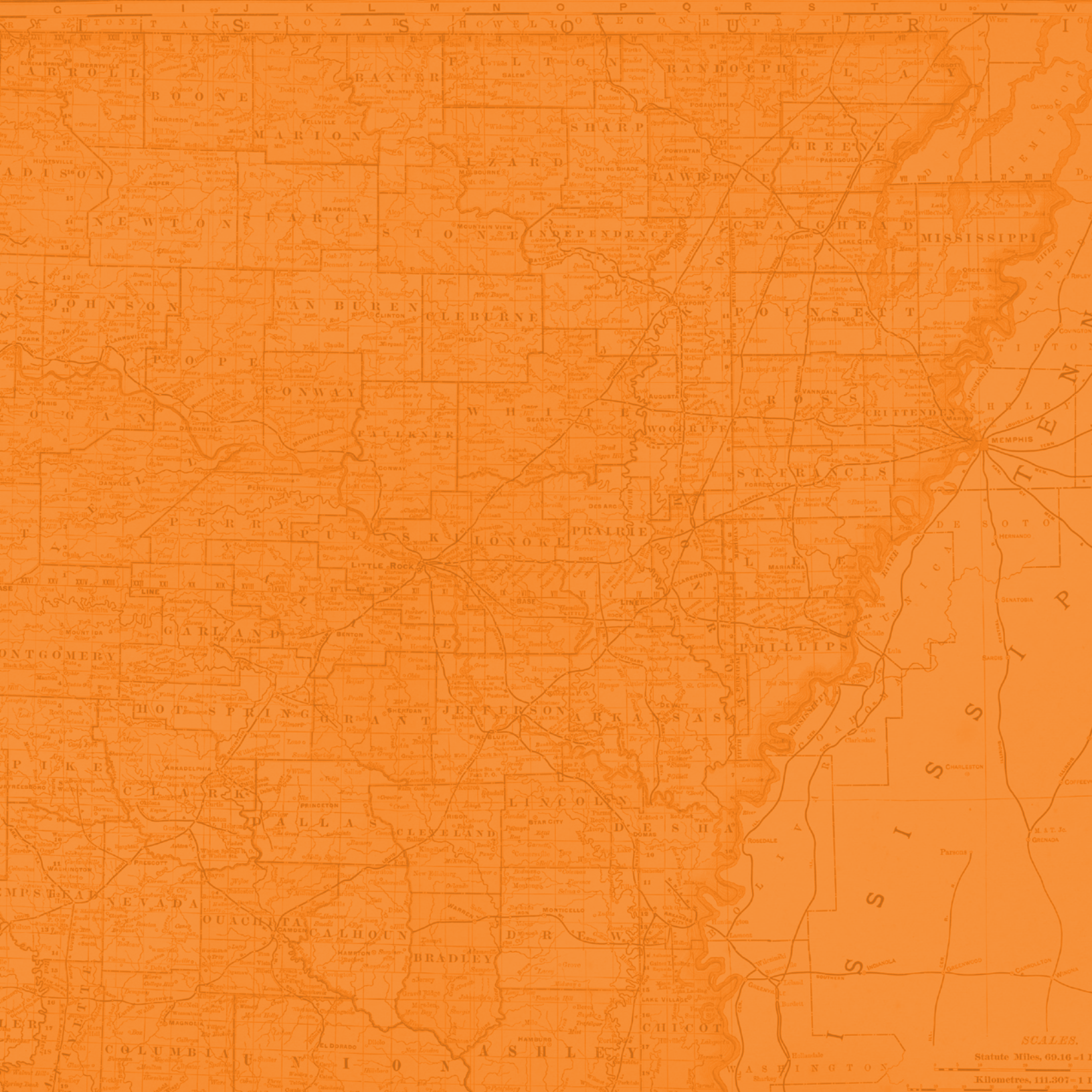

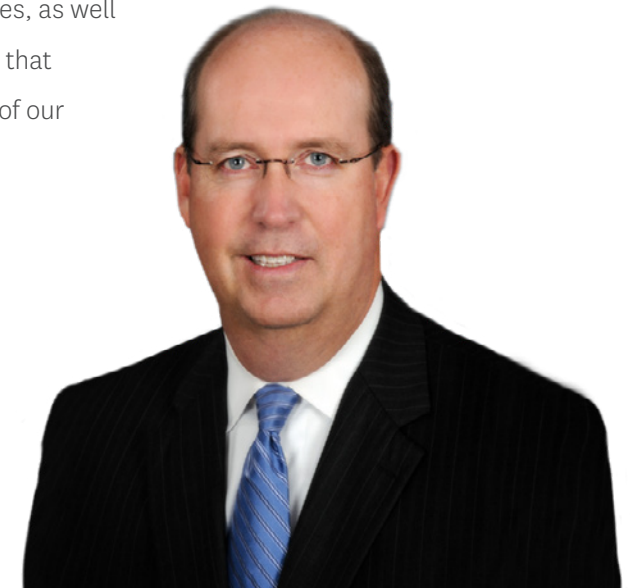

2020 Foodbank donation

COVID-19 has had an impact on everyone, including organizations that work to fight against food insecurity. That's why, in 2020, Arkansas Health & Wellness donated \$100,000 to the Arkansas Foodbank to help with COVID-19 relief. With this donation, the Arkansas Foodbank was able to acquire and distribute more food across the state to those in need, providing much-needed relief to the individuals most affected by COVID-19.

Arkansas ranks second in the nation for food insecurity, meaning that approximately one in five Arkansans are struggling to get enough food. The Arkansas Foodbank is the largest hunger-relief organization in the state, serving 33 of Arkansas' 75 counties and feeding more than 280,000 people every year. The Foodbank works year-round to provide hunger relief where it's needed most — among children, families, and seniors.

Our support has helped the Arkansas Foodbank improve the nutritional quality of the food they provide. In recent years, the Foodbank has been able to work with other community partners, such as UAMS, to host nutrition workshops for its agencies. These nutrition workshops have helped connect 30 agencies to the resources they need to teach families how to shop smarter, make healthier food decisions, and cook more affordable meals. Arkansas Health & Wellness is proud to partner with the Arkansas Foodbank in helping Arkansas live better.



Arkansas Foodbank Volunteer Efforts

In October 2020, the QualChoice business services team combined team building and volunteerism by spending their time helping the Arkansas Foodbank feed Arkansans. While there, the team learned about the history of the Arkansas Foodbank and how their assistance will help make a difference in addressing food insecurity in the state.

The Arkansas Foodbank receives many non-perishable donations in bulk, including pasta. The QualChoice team's role was to weigh and package pasta donations so they could be sent to Foodbank locations across the state.

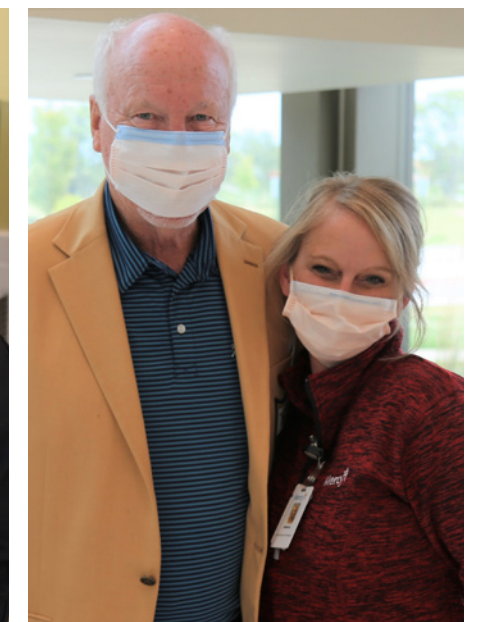


Promoting Vaccines with Pro Football Hall of Famer Cliff Harris

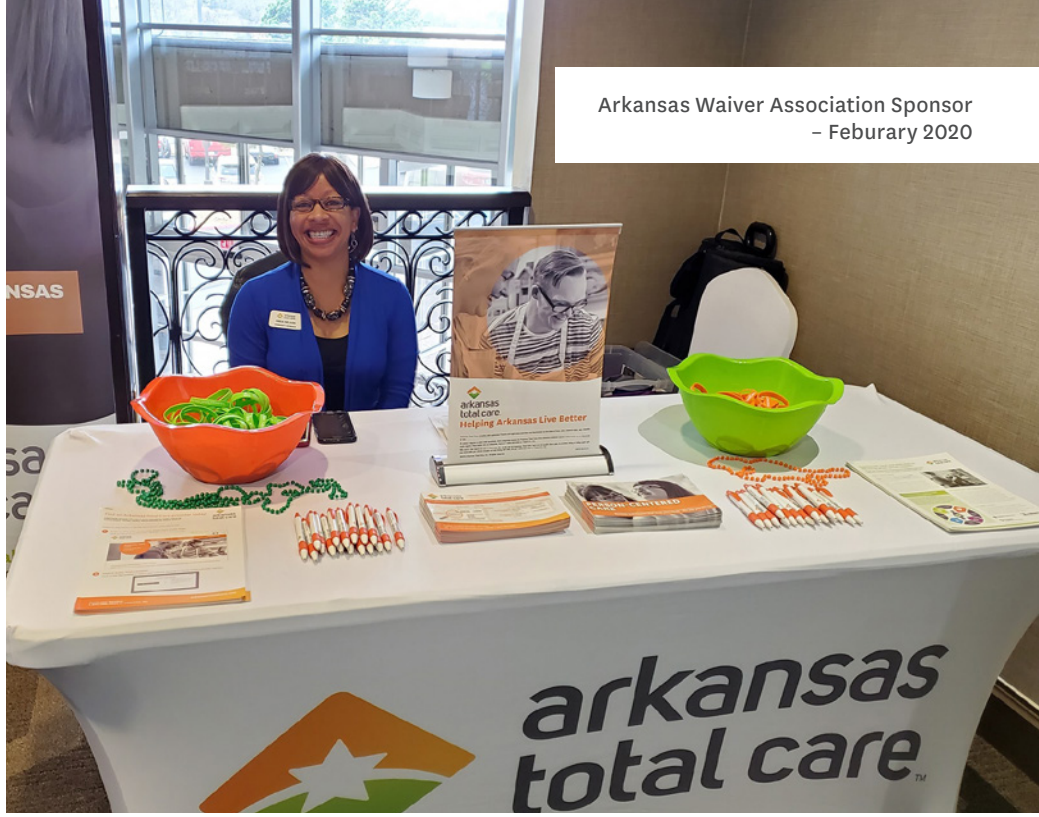

First Arkansas Gives Back Fundraiser

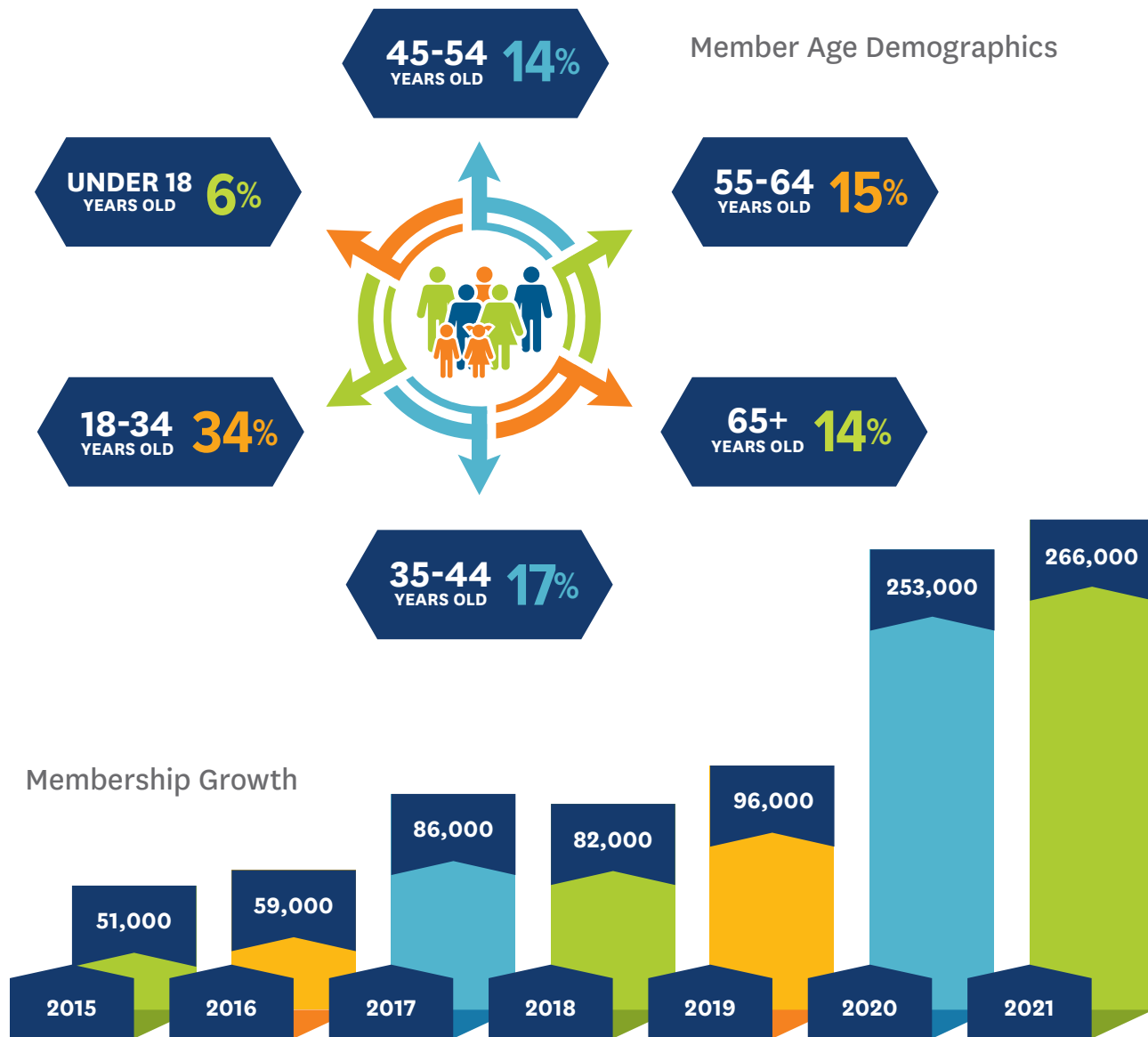
