We hope you had a happy and healthy summer. Here's what's on our study list for fall:

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Back-to-School Topic: Immunizations

Fall is a good time to think about your child's immunizations. Most schools call for up-to-date immunizations, and if your child's vaccines aren't current, he or she may be prevented from going to school.

Immunizations can help your child avoid serious health problems—and even death. Vaccines are fully tested by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). And there's no proof that autoimmune diseases, asthma, autism, or other problems are linked to any vaccines advised by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP).

ACIP is a group of medical and public health experts that has crafted the U.S. child immunization plan for 14 illnesses:

- Chickenpox
- Diphtheria
- Hepatitis A
- Hepatitis B
- Hib (Haemophilus influenzae type b)
- Fli
- Measles
- Mumps
- Pertussis (whooping cough)
- Pneumococcal conjugate
- Polio
- Rotavirus
- Rubella
- Tetanus

The ACIP schedule tells you which vaccines your child should get and when, from birth through age 6. Following the schedule is worth it! Warding off disease is always better than treating



it. Some diseases come with long-term problems. Illnesses can spread to other people, too, even years later. Pregnant women who have not had the rubella (German measles) shot can pass the virus on to their babies.

You can't protect your child from all harm. But you can keep track of the dates when vaccines are due. Along with serving up healthy meals and using a car seat, making sure your child gets the necessary shots is one more way to help keep him or her safe and healthy.


Learn to Use Your Preventive Health **Benefits**

Most health plans must cover certain preventive services screenings, checkups, and counseling—to keep you from getting sick. QualChoice follows the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) suggested list of services to be offered at no cost in a "wellness exam."

Doctors may do tests during a wellness exam that are not part of this list—things such as a urinalysis, a complete blood count, or a vitamin D screening. If your doctor orders these or other tests not suggested by the USPSTF as part of a wellness exam, you may have to pay the bill. Check the USPSTF list at uspreventiveservicestaskforce.org. When you have your yearly wellness exam, ask your doctor to make sure that all wellness tests are on the list!

Your doctor may have other reasons for doing tests not suggested for the wellness exam. In this case QualChoice covers them the same way as any other medically necessary tests (to find or treat an illness, injury, or health problem).

Antibiotics 101 Get Smart About Antibiotics Week Is November 17–23



At some time you've probably taken an antibiotic—a drug that fights disease by killing bacteria. It can knock out an infection, making sure you don't become sicker. It can even save your life.

But antibiotic overuse causes the growth of bacteria (germs) that don't react to antibiotics. This is called antibiotic resistance, and it's one of the world's most pressing public health threats.

Antibiotics Don't Work for All Illnesses

Some infections are caused by bacteria (bacterial infections). Other infections are caused by viruses (viral infections). Antibiotics can cure only bacterial infections. Treating a virus with antibiotics doesn't work. It can even make you more likely to get a bacterial infection that can't be cured by antibiotics.

More than 50 percent of antibiotics are ordered for illnesses such as coughs and colds, most of which are caused by viruses. Up to half of the antibiotic use in hospitals is either not needed or is not the right type of treatment. Three out of 10 children who visit a doctor with the common cold are given an antibiotic. In children, reactions to antibiotics are a common cause of emergency room visits.

We Must Act Now

Patients, health care experts, hospitals, and lawmakers must work together to make sure we use antibiotics wisely—to make health care better and to save lives.

Antibiotic resistance is not just a problem for the person with the infection. Some resistant germs can spread to others—causing more antibiotic-resistant sickness.

What You Can Do

Here are some tips to keep in mind the next time you're sick:

- Take prescribed antibiotics exactly as your doctor says. Don't skip any doses—even when you start feeling better.
- Make sure you only take antibiotics that are prescribed for you. Don't share them with other people. And don't use drugs from another time you were sick. Antibiotics treat certain types of sickness. Taking the wrong drug may allow more bacteria to grow.
- Don't ask for antibiotics if your doctor thinks you don't need them. They can have side effects and may do more harm than good.

NEW! Online Payment



Employers and individual plan members can now pay their QualChoice bills quickly and securely online from their bank account. Processing takes two business days in most cases. For accounts on pharmacy or medical hold, it may be up to two business days after payment is processed before those benefits are restored.

Payment information must be re-entered each month. To set up automatic payments, employers must fill out and send the Authorization Agreement for Automatic Payments - Group form. Go to qualchoice.com, select Employers then Forms. Individuals should use the IQChoice Billing and Payment Authorization Form. Go to qualchoice.com, select Members then Forms.
